



From Pastor Jayneann's pen



On my way to or from Israel/Palestine in November (I don't remember which, those flights are all a blur) I watched the movie *Avatar*. It was a way to pass some time. Being environmentally minded I enjoyed the movie, but I'm not going to talk about that.

In the course of the movie, the lead male and female characters bonded. I was struck by the way in which their culture – fictional though it was – identified that they were claiming the relationship.

“I see you.”

It's a special thing when we feel that someone really, truly sees us as we are. So often we want to remake people and they want to remake us. We want to fit others in the niches we already have in our lives. Instead of welcoming them in all their quirky fullness, we say or hear, “If only you'd... (fill in the blank)” or “Why do you...”

How wonderful when we can know a person completely and accept them just as they are. And how precious it is to us when we feel known and accepted just as we are.

Two thousand years ago, people were always around Jesus because of his preaching, teaching, and healing. Jesus truly saw all the people; and as a result, people were always with him.

As we work to make more and deeper connections in our communities, we would do well to follow Jesus' example, to notice how he responded to the crowds.

Beginning February 10th, we will be starting a new worship series called, “See All the People.”

In this Season after Epiphany (that's what we call the time after Christmas but before Lent)

let's see what new and familiar ways we can come up with to make connections with the people in our communities.

Besides this, let's keep going with our Breakthrough Prayer. This prayer is a way for all of us, together, to ask God to reveal the direction God would have us go, the ministries God would have us tackle, the people God would have us know. Like I mentioned last month, we are asking God to do what we cannot do on our own – even when it means changing our church, even when it means changing ourselves.

God, our hope beyond our own abilities and our light in the shadows, help us to draw close to you and to notice your actions that are as many and as varied as the snowflakes. Let something wonderful begin through us.

Amen.

So let's keep praying. And let's keep watching for some of the many ways that God is breaking through into the life of First Church.



Random Thoughts - February 2019 by Mike Zahn

There is a Special Session of the General Conference Feb. 23-26 in St. Louis to decide between three options that the council of Bishops are offering as a "Way Forward" on sexuality. Here are summaries of each:

One Church Plan Summary (recommended by the Council of Bishops):

- ◆ Affirms sexual relations only within the covenant of monogamous marriage between two adults (thereby permitting homosexual marriage)
- ◆ Declares we are not of one mind regarding human sexuality and permits persons in the church to interpret and decide issues of human sexuality differently
- ◆ Permits pastors to bless monogamous homosexual marriages anywhere secular law permits such mar-

riages

- ◆ Removes restrictive language from the *Book of Discipline* that prohibits same-gender weddings at UMC properties and ordination of "self-avowed practicing homosexuals"
- ◆ Does not require churches or conferences to accept such practices and contains language to protect consciences of pastors and congregations

Connectional Plan Summary:

- ◆ Replaces current five U.S. jurisdictional conferences with three connectional conferences based on affinity on issues related to the definition of marriage and ordination standards - Progressive, Unity, and Traditional
- ◆ All three would use a general *Book of Discipline* (Articles of Religion, General Rules, Confession of Faith) with the ability to adapt other portions to their context of ministry
- ◆ Provides space for different practices and beliefs by the different connectional conferences
- ◆ Central conferences could choose to be own connectional conference or join a U.S. one
- ◆ Requires numerous Constitutional Amendments

"Modified" Traditional Plan Summary:

- ◆ Retains the church's current position on the practice of homosexuality, enhances accountability, and provides a gracious exit path from annual conferences, local churches, and clergy who cannot abide by the requirements of the *Book of Discipline* into a new self-governing Methodist church





New Nonprofit Turns Coffee into Employment

In a small basement office in Oklahoma City, a new non-profit is hoping coffee can address a societal problem: employment after incarceration.

Red River Roasters is dreaming big and starting small: three flavors, three blends, one grinder and one heat sealer. The endeavor was founded by Redemption Church, a ministry of Oklahoma's Criminal Justice and Mercy Ministries that meets at OKC-Penn Ave.

Crystal King, the first, and so far only, employee, grinds and seals each pound of coffee by hand. She likened the work to starting a small business one relationship at a time. "I am not a salesman, but when it comes to the mission of helping people come out of prison, I can be excited about that," King said. "I am one of those people."

King, who was previously incarcerated for 42 months, is a graduate of Exodus House, a temporary residential program that helps people newly released from prison re-enter society. She believes Red River Roasters has the potential to change lives. "It's truly scary to be a success (after incarceration). The statistics are stacked against you," King said. "What people need are jobs. That can be the difference between succeeding and going back to prison."

This sentiment was the motivating factor behind start-

ing the business, according to Rev. Brad Rogers, pastor of OKC-Penn Ave. and Redemption Church. He said a conversation with the coffee supplier for Redemption Church led to the choice to create Red River Roasters.

The nonprofit has received some support as they get started, such as a donated coffee grinder, donated tables, and a CPA who donated time to set up the 501(c) 3 designation. The church also received a New People New Places grant that in part supports the work of reducing recidivism through employment.

Rogers said that while they hope to grow enough to roast their own beans and provide full coffee service to their customers, the coffee is just the means used to provide hope to the incarcerated community. "While we've become passionate about coffee and still have a lot to learn, coffee comes second to the mission of changing lives and providing opportunities for the incarcerated community," Rogers said. "As we gain success in this area, we will have a positive social impact on not only the lives of individuals such as Crystal, but also on the greater community."

For her part, King is excited about the possibilities. She plans to continue marketing to United Methodist churches in the district as well as other nonprofits. "Being a part of something like this is a game changer," King said. "It can change somebody's life. It changed my life."

- ⇒ Ditto to different people joining us at Coffee Fellowship after worship.
- ⇒ More than thirty percent of the people who completed Estimate of Financial Giving cards increased their amounts.
- ⇒ We have two great entryways now.

The list goes on and on. If you have ever wondered if your prayers matter, they do! Keep praying and asking God to help us be who God knows we can be!

Resources for Ministry

A Financial Narrative for February 2019

Throughout 2018 I've written a series of articles describing the financial process our church uses. The goal was to help you understand this process without getting bogged down in lists of numbers.

But the numbers are important and the Finance Committee has been watching them carefully throughout the year. Out of a budget of \$359,000 we ended up being only \$1,200 short. Thanks to everyone for your generous giving that help us to do God's work here in Wausau and beyond!

As a finance committee we try to be good stewards of the money that you entrust to us, but we also need to be good stewards of all the resources the church has. One of the resources we have to work with is the endowment. Over many years, church members have made significant contributions that have been invested through the United Methodist Foundation. Many of these funds have specific designations, such as for pastoral housing, organ maintenance, or college scholarships. Other funds don't have such restrictions and are available to use as approved of by the Finance Committee, Board of Trustees and Ministries Council.

Unfortunately, we have been relying on these funds more than I, and other church leadership, likes to see. Of our total income in 2018, \$45,000 came from the endowment (and we'll need to take the \$1,200 deficit from there, too). Even in good years this is beyond the earning potential of the unrestricted funds and could lead to severely depleting our endowment accounts.

What should we do about this?

First, we should be thankful that we have enough resources to be able to worry about how to spend them. Our forefathers and mothers gave us gifts that we are able to use as we face the changes we as a congregation are going through. Now we need to look at how we approach the coming years as faithful followers of Christ. Our desire is to build on what we already are as a congregation to make ourselves a stronger community within the Wausau area. Our involvement in MCCI is a major part of that. We need to prayerfully work toward growing our congregation. Will that resolve our financial future? Not necessarily, but it will help us become a stronger church, which will be better able to weather the unknown future. And with the gift of the endowment we have some buffer we can use to tide us over as we grow in a new direction.

How (and Why) Shall We Worship?

The worship committee is meeting for the first time. The chairperson asks the pastor, “What are we supposed to accomplish with this committee?”

The pastor answers, “Our goal is to facilitate good worship for our church.”

“How will we know when we have done that? The idea of ‘good worship’ seems a little vague to me.”

The pastor suggests, “Let’s poll this committee to find out what our expectations of “good worship” might be.”

“I like worship that uses the old traditional hymns, such as ‘Blessed Assurance.’”

“But my teenagers want gospel songs they can clap their hands to! Remember how much they liked the Christian rock music performed by that touring youth choir?”

A teenager joins in, “I didn’t like that at all! I find it embarrassing when my church tries to do that stuff.”

Another teen says, “I do like it, as long as it helps me and all of us feel the presence of the Holy Spirit.”

“I think we should always say the Lord’s Prayer.”

“But do we have to say it every Sunday? I like it when the pastor just makes up the prayer.”

“Isn’t worship supposed to give us something to think about?”

“We think all the time. We don’t need more thinking. We need more of the presence of God.”

The teenager speaks up again, “We can’t just think or feel all to ourselves and call ourselves Christians, right? We need worship to get us out there, to focus more on the social issues and people all around us, like hunger, or the homeless man who tries to wash our windshields when we get in our cars.”

“But let’s not forget personal conversion. That’s what Christianity is for. We can feed and house people all we want, but that won’t save them from hell or get them to heaven.”

We know worship is important, and we want it to be vibrant and vital. Yet, we have many diverse and sometimes incompatible ideas of what "good" worship on Sunday morning should include.

Does this scenario sound familiar in your congregation? We know worship is important, and we want it to be vibrant and vital. Yet, we have many diverse and sometimes incompatible ideas of what “good” worship on Sunday morning should include.

Some prefer what we call “traditional worship” that gives us a strong sense of continuity with our tradition, using traditional hymns, prayers, and creeds. Others prefer what has been called “contemporary worship,” which uses different technologies, leadership and music styles, and seems to appeal more to the experience of God in the now than the people’s connection with God across the ages and eternally. Some idealize worship that culminates in a call to conversion or commitment, while still others expect worship primarily to inspire or challenge their thinking.

These differences in expectations turn out not to be simply about style. More fundamentally, they’re about what we think we’re doing in worship, what we understand the ultimate purposes of worship may be...
